LIMITING DISTRACTIONS

DEADLINE TO REGISTER FOR SELF ASSESSMENT

5th October - deadline to register with HMRC if you became self-employed or start receiving income from property previous tax year

If you became self-employed or start receiving income from property previous tax year, the deadline to register with HMRC is October 5th of your business's second tax year. For example, if you started your

business in July 2023, you must register by October 5, 2024. Failing to register on time can result in penalties, so it's important to register as soon as you meet the requirements.



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
